As we continue further into the season of Epiphany with the Christmas season fading behind us and Lent on the horizon, this month our attention turns to Love. Love is a powerful and mysterious gift from God that helps us live in relationship with each other and in community. Sometimes, love is the only thing that keeps us together during times of struggle and pain. Yet, all too often, its a word that we throw around casually.

Love is a word we use freely for many things, to express affection for our spouses, family and children but also for our favorite foods, music and movies. With such a wide array of use, it can be easy to lose track of what love is all about. Anyone who has been to a wedding can tell you that there is a 50/50 chance of hearing 1 Corinthians 13:4-8 recited during the service or reception.

"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails."

Such aspirational words, words we may agree are not easy to live by every day. Just imagine if we could — what would that look like? We have been spending some time with Paul and his troubled church in Corinth for the past few weeks, and will continue with his struggles for some to come. Now is a good time for us to take a deeper look at some aspects of this gift of love in response to a community having trouble getting along. For Paul, if we are "in Christ" and abiding by his commands to love God with all that we are and to love our neighbor as our self, this is what love should look like, and it should be effortless.

Specifically, during this month that celebrates the feast of St. Valentine and Black History, we have an opportunity to live into a life of loving God and neighbor. Paul gives us the blueprint for the right mindset, that of Christ, which can help guide us into a more loving community. John, in his Gospel, goes further by stating that how we love each other will define our identity as followers of Christ, which is based on the God who first loved us — a Love that protects, trusts, is hopeful, perseveres and never fails.
